APCM Incumbent's Report 2018

I love books! Mostly historical and biographical books, but some stories too. Somebody once said to me that our lives are like books, full of different chapters. I think that is a good analogy. In the life of St. Barnabas Church we are experiencing a changing chapter now. Some of the people have changed, a number of whom have been significant in the previous chapters of the church's life, and yet the story continues.

In this report you will read of some of the continuing work, but also the on-going changes that are happening at St. Barnabas. For example, in January this year we witnessed the launch by the churchwardens, David Howell and Sandra Rice, of the 3rd Space, which marks a clear and significant new chapter in the life of the church. But this was also the culmination of months of work and consultation by a number of people through 2018. We owe David and Sandra our heartfelt thanks, as we do the many others who cannot be named here but have provided vitality to the life of the church community in chapters old and new.

The ministry team continues to change and develop too as a new chapter unfolds. During this year we have said final farewells to Elizabeth Gash (Licensed Lay Minister) as she moved with her husband Richard, to be closer to their family. But along with myself as vicar, and Mark Burton as Licensed Local Preacher, we also welcomed into the ministry team David Howell as another Licensed Local Preacher for St. Barnabas Church.

The nation will be focusing this year upon the implications of Brexit wherever it may be by 29th March. But there are also new and significant changes happening closer to home. This year will see the appointment of a new Bishop of Reading whose leadership will be presented with a number of issues and opportunities. For example, in Reading new housing developments will continue to change our social landscape, and we as a parish church will need to be sensitive to the needs of our neighbours, old and new, as we face this chapter together. What will it mean to reflect the servant ministry of Christ within our changing neighbourhoods? What should we be focusing on now as the Body of Christ? And what talents will this require from us for the well-being of all?

Challenging and necessary questions, not only for ourselves to answer, but also our neighbouring church of Caversham Park LEP in the benefice, and the wider churches in Reading as a whole. This will only appear daunting if we lose our faith in God, who is the Author of all things. But if we trust in God's Authorship this will free us to dedicate our talents and ourselves to God's Kingdom as we face writing a new chapter together with Him.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Parish comes within the Benefice of St Barnabas and Caversham Park. Both are separate parishes with their own officers and PCCs. Caversham Park Church is a Local Ecumenical Partnership. Derek Chandler is also the C of E incumbent for Caversham Park Church and they kindly donate £5000 annually to St Barnabas.

PCCs are charities governed by two pieces of Church of England legislation: the Parochial Church Councils (Powers) Measure 1956 as amended and the Church Representation Rules. The method of appointment of PCC members is set out in the Church Representation Rules. All eligible Church attendees are encouraged to register on the Electoral Roll and stand for election to the PCC.

The PCC held 5 meetings during the year. It is supported by committees and working groups that carry out detailed work.

The running of the church is supported by volunteers covering all areas of activity – Annex A

OBJECTIVES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

The PCC has the responsibility of co-operating with the incumbent in promoting, in the ecclesiastical parish, the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical.

It has maintenance responsibilities for the church and the church hall.

COMPLIANCE

The PCC members (the Trustees) of St Barnabas Church, Emmer Green, Reading (Number 1164759) in agreeing this Annual Report noted that they were fully aware of the Charity Commission Guidance on Public Benefit and were of the opinion that the activities of St Barnabas Church met the Charity Commission requirements.

CHURCH ATTENDANCE

At March 2018 there were 128 parishioners on the Electoral Roll, after taking into account movers and joiners. The average weekly Sunday attendance (normal 8am and 9.30am services) , counted in October 2018, was 70.25. This number increases at festivals and special services. The largest attendance was at the Nativity Service with a total of 238. Largest schools attendance was The Hill Primary School for Nativity and Carols, with three services back to back with a total attendance of 717. Puppets were used at all three services.

CHURCH MANAGEMENT AND FINANCE

Overview of PCC year

The PCC:

- agreed a “**Parish Safeguarding Policy**” and agreed to follow the guidance of the Diocesan Safeguarding Officer after seeking his advice
- agreed to adopt the “**Giving Scheme**” promoted by the Oxford Diocese and agreed that Richard Cunningham take over the responsibilities for Giving previously held by Bill Harper
- agreed plans for the introduction of arrangements to meet the **General Data Protection Regulations** which were successfully implemented
- agreed the appointment of Richard Cunningham as **Electoral Roll Officer**
- agreed that David Howell should be recommended for training as a Licensed **Local Preacher**
- and Caversham Park LEP agreed that the **Benefice Service** should take place at 10.30am and not the usual 9.30am
- gave permission for Joy Abel, Mark Burton and David Howell to deliver **Home Communion**
- following much discussion and investigation during the year agreed a new initiative for 2019 - **3rd Space** – a concept similar to “Cafe” church
- sadly lost a valuable and well loved member when **Jean Rae** died in the Spring
- accepted with regret the resignation of **Joyce Bedingfield** whose short stay on the PCC was marked by considered and thoughtful contributions.

Health and Safety

The benefits and concept of a positive Health & Safety Culture at St Barnabas continues with helpful support from members of the congregation which is appreciated. Specific personal responsibility for Health & Safety matters generally rests with The Vicar supported by the Church Wardens. Following completion of the Parish Centre, the Health and Safety Policy now applies across the Church Building, the Church Hall, & the Parish Centre,

plus the Parish Garden. The past year has been very quiet in terms of Health & Safety issues without any incidents which require comment.

For the general safety of all members of St Barnabas and visitors to our premises, it is important that we all continue to be vigilant to the ethos and general principle of creating a safe environment in which to operate. The requirements of the Policy continue to be reviewed on a regular basis with changes to procedures implemented as appropriate. Suggestions and ideas to improve Health and Safety matters generally are always welcome.

Safeguarding

In line with The Church of England's "Parish Safeguarding Handbook 2018", St Barnabas fully supports the key responsibilities for parishes that are outlined in the "House of Bishops' Safeguarding Policy and Practice Guide. The PCC and the incumbent have a duty of care to ensure the protection of the vulnerable in their church community.

Joy Abel is the Parish Safeguarding Officer (PSO) and David Howell is the Parish Safeguarding Administrator and Verifier. Due to a heavy workload David will retire from the role when a full audit and review has been completed of our procedures, practices, DBS checks and training needs. Our processes and procedures were last reviewed and approved by the PCC in February 2018, therefore may require changes in line with the House of Bishops' policies and practices.

Safeguarding is a standard item at each PCC meeting and the PSO contact details are on the Elected Officers notice board.

During 2018 all PCC elected members were DBS checked and there were no major reported incidents.

Electoral Roll.

I have taken this duty over from Richard Gash. Every six years a new roll needs to be prepared (the old one must not be copied-over) and as I write (late January) we are doing just that. The old roll, with gains and losses, at the end of the year contained 129 names. Completion of the new roll is on track and already contains 80 names. The job of asking those who have not yet filled in a new roll has been divided up among the PCC. By the time of the APCM the roll will be closed and due to be sent off to the deanery secretary.

Planned giving.

I have taken this duty over from Bill Harper and have been keeping records of who-gave-what week-by-week since the start of July 2018. I have submitted one claim to the tax office (Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs, HMRC) and they have paid us the monies claimed. For the period July 1st to November 30th we received a refund of £3756.98. I anticipate another claim at the end of this tax year, which ends on 5th April.

The details of the schemes are worth setting out for the record. First, we can easily claim tax back where I have on file a personal declaration that we can claim gift aid: anyone who pays income tax is welcome to fill in a form; please ask me. Monies that are paid by bank standing order or in the little coloured numbered envelopes are 'in' this scheme. For those who are visiting once-off (for example, a funeral) there are little white envelopes with a gift-aid declaration printed on the front.

Second, there is another HMRC scheme called "Gift Aid Small Donations Scheme" (GASDS) which allows a tax claim on cash, up to £20 per gift. Cheques and £50 notes can't be counted. There is a limit of £8,000 that can be claimed in each financial year, and the tax refund on that is £2,000 per year. Cash in the offertory plate, and cash in numbered envelopes where I don't have a gift-aid declaration goes into this scheme.

The third scheme is the 'new' Parish Giving Scheme (PGS) which is run by a central office on behalf of many parishes. This scheme 'collects regular donations by direct debit and once a month pays both the monies collected and the HMRC tax refund to the parish. This has two benefits: quicker and more frequent claims, and also less book-keeping work for me. So I urge all of you who have a standing order to make the switch to PGS as soon as you can. For details, please ask me.

If you're around on a Tuesday morning then you may hear Mark Jameson, a local organist, and on Thursday mornings, Wendy Preston, a local pianist, practising. The instruments benefit from being played more regularly, and both players also contribute to the costs of maintaining the instruments.

Children's Church

Children's Church continues to run during the 9:30 am service except during COGS or during the main school holidays. Children's Church is for any child over 3, although at the moment the children who come are between the ages of 7 and 11. The sessions are based around the Bible, both New and Old Testament, and include reading the Bible together, learning what it is saying to us, praying and various other activities. Attendance at Children's Church reflects the pattern of families attendance at church which for some families may be monthly, or more or less regularly.

We have an enthusiastic group of volunteers to lead the sessions which are enjoyed by all who attend and our thanks go to them. We are looking for more people who would be prepared to help occasionally by being there on the day as a second adult, as and when extra help is needed.

At Christmas a group of families, both old and new, spent several Sundays rehearsing for the Nativity Service which was a great success and enjoyed by all who took part or attended.

We have been considering changing the name of Children's Church and will be talking to the children about any ideas they have or whether it should be "Investigators" as used previously for the older children only, or something else.

We also run a monthly family table tennis session on the first Sunday of the month from 14:30p.m. to 16:00p.m. This is enjoyed by families from St. Barnabas as well as those who are not otherwise part of St. Barnabas.

Generally the craft relates to the story and seems to be enjoyed by both parents and children.

BUILDING MANAGEMENT

Building Management – Church & Centre

The buildings (Hall, Church & Parish Centre) continue in generally good order, with few exceptional repairs or purchases required.

Several issues with the hot water boiler in the Parish Centre were fixed at a cost of £489. Some minor changes were made to lighting in both the Church and the Hall amounting to costs of £1,100. Cost for minor changes and tuning the piano and organ were £722. And lastly the largest area was gardening with £2,200 of costs, mostly spent on a new lawn mower and tree surgery/ground clearance.

The leak in the Parish Centre roof, by the Clergy Office has returned and will require fixing in 2019, though I don't know how.

The ageing tables in the Parish Centre meeting room were kindly replaced by Steve Mardell

A volunteer is being sought who will take over the chairmanship and oversight for Hall & Building related matters.

Church Hall

St Barnabas Hall has got lots of interesting regular users open to all of us, for a small fee. Do have a look at the programme of events on the notice boards, or on-line on the St Barnabas Church website under "External Users". Newcomers are welcome to all classes; some may offer a trial class free of charge.

Hall rental brought in a record total of £23285 this year, with lots of regular users hiring the Hall, but also because the hourly rental charge went up to £15 per hour. Our regular hirers love the Hall – as do families who hire for children's parties. It's light and modern inside, despite the not so modern iron clad exterior. In 2018, items of planned maintenance were installing insulation above the ladies and gents toilets and installing a heater in the ladies toilet.

I'm pleased that the Hall was able to support our Church with a substantial amount of money. Our Church has priority to use the Hall for social and fundraising events, of course.

Thank you to our regular users – Rosehill WI, Age UK, two Art Workshops, Singing for the Brain and various dance, Pilates, yoga and exercise classes. You can see the activities on our Church website. We are the home of the Rainbow Group, two Brownie packs and the Guides, who all have large numbers of girls attending.

Thanks to Shirley Choules who keeps the Hall, and the Church Centre, nice and clean. Thanks again go to the people in the congregation who help with maintenance – Bob Abel in particular for accounts & billing, and others for painting, drains, bins, electrical checking and so on.

WIDER CHURCH and DEANERY SYNOD

Introduction

St Barnabas is part of Reading Deanery, which is part of Oxford Diocese. All churches in a deanery have representatives on their deanery synod, and deaneries elect members to Oxford Diocesan Synod.

Reading Deanery Synod Business

Reading Deanery Synod has delegated authority from Oxford Diocese to allocate the Parish Share to Reading churches – but it does much more. Deanery meetings usually start with a ‘Good News’ story, which can be very inspiring, showing where God is at work in Reading today.

GDPR

GDPR is an issue for all organisations. The situation with deanery synods is rather complex as they have an indeterminate legal status, so it is problematic to decide who is responsible for the use of data.

Mission Action Plan

Reading Deanery has developed a Mission Action Plan (MAP) for developing its mission in the area. In December, members were asked to discuss what they were doing over Christmas and how this would bring those in the community closer to Church.

Portable Baptistery

Reading Deanery has purchased a portable baptistery which may be borrowed by churches for total immersion baptism of adults.

Generous Giving

The Oxford Diocese Generous Giving adviser gave a talk on the new Giving Scheme. If it is introduced through teaching on Christian generosity, then it can be very effective leading to church members increasing their giving. Churches that have done so have seen substantial increases in giving.

Try Something New Grants

“Try Something New” was a Deanery initiative where churches were given a small grant of £250 to carry out a missionary activity that they would otherwise not have carried out. In 2019 the grant available will be £500 and it must be cross-generational – working with children and young people and other generations.

Another Deanery Representative needed

We are entitled to three Deanery Synod Representatives, but only have two. Please consider whether you should put yourself forward.

Oxford Diocesan Synod

Oxford Diocesan Synod discusses strategic matters and decides policy which has an impact on all churches in the Diocese. It can also influence national policy.

Disinvestment from fossil fuel companies

Oxford Diocese proposed the National Church disinvest from fossil fuel companies. Investment conveys a view that we support the continued use of fossil fuel during a time of global warming. The opposing view was that these companies can be influenced. In the end General Synod did not fully support Oxford Diocese's position.

Setting God's People Free

The Setting God's People Free Report has been influential and affects the Diocese's vision for growing discipleship throughout the Diocese.

Common Vision

Oxford Diocese is committed to growth via growing discipleship and increasing mission. A new budgeting method called Total Return Accounting means that where Capital reserves have increased, the amount above 7% per year can be used as revenue. This revenue will be applied to the Diocese's mission and churches will be able to bid for two types of grants: up to £2,500; or above £ 2,500 .
