Welcome

Christmas always seems to be accompanied by jolly songs, ringing tills, and the expectation that you will have a good time. But that's not how it feels for many people. Maybe your year has been hard – for whatever reason – and Christmas seems to highlight the difficulties. Or maybe in an over-busy life, you just want space to reflect, recall, regroup.

Whatever the reason, whatever the need, you are welcome here. We hope that you will find the space and hope which the Christmas story offers.

We remain seated for the whole service. Please join in as much or as little as you wish: the words we say together are in bold type; we shall gently sing the carols; there is an opportunity to place and light candles during our time together. Or simply rest, be still, and hear the mystery of the Christmas story.

Opening Responses

We meet in the name of a loving God.

All: Who knows our needs, Hears our cries And heals our wounds.

The first candle we light is to remember those whom we have loved and lost. We pause to remember their name, their face, their voice, the memory that binds them to us in this season.

We pause as the candle is lit

All: May God's eternal love surround them.

The second candle we light is to redeem the pain of loss, the loss of someone who was very important to us, part of our lives, part of our own selves.

We pause to gather up the pain of the past and offer it to God, asking that from God's hands we receive the gift of peace.

We pause as the candle is lit

All: Refresh, restore, renew us O God, and lead us into your future.

The third candle we light is to remember ourselves this Christmas time. We pause and remember these past weeks and months, the disbelief, the anger, the down times, the poignancy of reminiscing, the hugs and handshakes of family and friends, all those who stood with us. We give thanks for all the support we have known.

We pause as the candle is lit

All: Let us remember that dawn defeats darkness, life overcomes death.

The fourth candle is lit to remember our faith and the gift of hope which the Christmas story offers to us. We remember that God, who shares our life, promises us a place and time of no more pain and suffering.

We pause as the candle is lit

All: Let us remember the One who shows the way, Who brings the truth and who bears the light.

The large Christ candle will remain unlit as a sign of waiting for a future that is yet unknown to us, from which God beckons us.

Placing of candles

During this carol you are invited to place your unlit candle by the four lit candles, as a symbol of our longing for light in the darkness.
